Typically, the southwest monsoon makes its onset over Kerala by June 1 and covers the entire country

Ceasefire reached after Pakistan dials India: FS Misri

Trump says US mediated truce talks



NEW DELHI, MAY 10: After days of military escalation and heightened tensions, there was a surprise truce between the two countries today after Pakistan reached out to India, and the two countries negotiated directly and agreed to a ceasefire.

"The Director General of Military Operations (DGMO) of Pakistan called the DGMO of India at 15.30 hours (3.30 pm) this afternoon. It was agreed between them that both sides would cease all firing and military action on land, in the air, and at sea with effect from 1700 hours (5

pm)," Foreign Secretary Vikram Misri said.

The Foreign Secretary, in a brief press conference announcing the ceasefire agreement, added, "Instructions have been given on both sides to implement this understanding. The Directors General of Military Operations will speak again on May 12.

Minutes before India confirmed the ceasefire and details of the talks, US President Trump claimed it was the result of US-mediated discussions between the two nations.

"After a long night of talks mediated by the United States, I am pleased to announce that India and Pakistan have agreed to a full and immediate ceasefire. Congratulations to both countries on using common sense and great intelligence. Thank you for your attention to this matter!," the US President posted on Truth Social.

'Any future terror act will be considered Act of War against India'

NEW DELHI, MAY 10: Any future act of terror in India will be considered an "act of war" against the country and will be responded to accordingly, top government sources said on Saturday.

With this decision, the government headed by Prime Minister Narendra Modi seeks to draw red lines against terror incidents and makes clear its intention to firmly respond to the perpetrators and conspirators, in what is seen as a message to Pakistan - a country linked to various terrorist groups involved in targeting Indians.

The decision comes amid an intensifying conflict with Pakistan following the Pahalgam terror attack on April 22, which had left 26 civilians, mostly tourists, dead.

curity Advisor (NSA) Ajit Doval and External Affairs Minister S Jaishankar have been in discussions with their US counterparts for several days regarding a ceasefire. They have been consistently updating the Prime Minister on the developments. Sources also added that India decided to implement the ceasefire on its own terms.

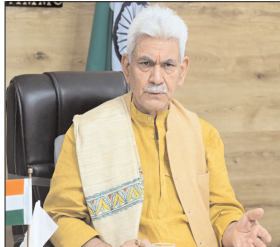
S Jaishankar also said the ceasefire agreement was worked between India and Pakistan.

"India and Pakistan have today worked out an understanding on stoppage of firing and military action. India has consistently maintained a firm and uncompromising stance against terrorism in all its forms and manifestations. It will continue to do so," he said.

However, the United States played a role in de-escalating the situation by exerting direct pressure on Pakistan, reportedly tying

While Pakistan today violated ceasefire at multiple places along the IB and the LoC hours after the two countries announced a truce; ADDC, Rajouri, and a BSF Sub-Inspector were among six persons who lost their lives in heavy Pak shelling in the morning.

In a violation of the ceasefire agreement, Pak drones were observed flying at multiple locations across Jammu and Kashmir on Saturday night, prompting swift action by the armed forces which shot them down with the air defence mechanism.

Early this morning, Pak drones hit multiple places in Jammu city and its suburbs, resulting in the death of a person and injuries to over 20 others. Cars

Terrorist launchpad in Pak destroyed

JAMMU, MAY 10: BSF today said it had "completely destroyed" a terrorist launchpad opposite Akhnour in Jammu in response to the unprovoked firing from the other side along the International Border.

The base was located at Looni in Pakistan's Sialkot district, a BSF spokesperson said.

This came after Pakistan initiated "unprovoked" firing on BSF posts in Jammu sector.

The BSF responded in a commensurate manner, causing widespread damage to the posts and assets of the Pakistan Rangers along the IB, the spokesperson said.

The terrorist launchpad at Looni in Sialkot district, opposite Akhnour area, was completely destroyed by the BSF, he added.

"Our resolve to protect India's sovereignty is unshaken," he said.

IC-814 planner among 5 top terrorists killed in Op Sindoor

NEW DELHI, MAY 10: The Indian strikes on terror nerve centres of Lashkar-e-Taiba and Jaish-e-Mohammad in Pakistan and Pakistan-occupied Jammu and Kashmir under Operation Sindoor on May 7 have neutralised five most wanted terrorists of these organisations, including the mastermind of IC-814 hijacking in 1999.

The funerals of these terrorists were attended by senior Pakistan army officers and police personnel, besides wreaths were placed

on behalf of chief minister of Pakistan's Punjab province, Maryam Nawaz, providing an open testimony of the Pakistan State's collusion with terrorist organisations, officials said.

Mohammad Yusuf Azhar, listed at No 21 in the most wanted list of terrorists prepared by the Union Home Ministry, is the brother-in-law of Masood Azhar, a top terrorist and founder of JeM.

He was the mastermind of the hijacking of the Indian Airlines plane IC-814

in which Masood Azhar was released with two other dreaded terrorists in exchange of passengers and crew members of the Indian Airlines flight that was taken to Kandhar in southern Afghanistan by the terrorists.

Masood Azhar was then lodged in Kot-Bhalwal jail on the outskirts of Jammu city.

Yusuf Azhar was present in the Bahawalpur headquarters of the JeM, where he imparted weapons' training to the cadres, with

Ceasefire welcome but Pakistan must learn its lesson: Kavinder

Senior BJP leader and ex-deputy CM Kavinder Gupta today welcomed the ceasefire decision at the Indo-Pak border, calling it a significant and positive move towards de-escalation.

He said that while India has always stood for peace, it will not hesitate to defend its sovereignty and the safety of its citizens.

"This is a welcome step. India has never desired war, but Pakistan's continu-



ous provocation through terrorism and proxy attacks has left no room for complacency," Gupta said, referring to the April 22 attack at Pahalgam in which 25 Hindu tourists and a local were killed by the Pakistan-sponsored terrorists. He underlined that In-

dia's response to these provocations was swift, strong and decisive, sending a clear message to Pakistan and the global community.

"A befitting reply was given to Pakistan's aggression, forcing them to seek intervention from the United States. This itself speaks volumes about the pressure they are under," he remarked.

Gupta emphasised that India's strength should never be underestimated. "Pakistan must understand that any misadventure will
